High School students live in poverty. Most families are worried about the basics like putting food on the table and working multiple jobs, writes Melissa Silverberg of the Daily Herald.

By the Marie Wilkinson Food Pantry assisting students with food and recipes we assisted over 900 students to shop for their 4,047 family members, of whom, 1,252 were younger siblings just in the 2018-19 school year.

Target Population of your organization and project According to Feeding America our service area in 2014 reported that Kane County agencies are serving 141,700 people annually and 15,700 weekly. Of the people receiving food, 73% have incomes that fall below the federal poverty level. In the east Aurora school district area, 87% of families are below the poverty level. The Marie Wilkinson Food Pantry believes it is important to help nourish these families.

New in 2018 was our Student Food Program. Our east pantry was established 2 years ago, in Nov. 2017 we relocated this pantry into East Aurora High School (EAHS). On Jan.25th we launched our Student Food Program at EAHS with plans to add additional programs including working with the schools culinary class to develop easy, healthy recipes with cooking demonstrations to students as they pick up food.

The Marie Wilkinson Food Pantry has experience in both of these projects. The pantry has been in operation for over 60 years and entering the third year of the Food For Students program.

We have been working with Northern Illinois Food Bank and the Aurora East School District for this school based food pantry to expand efforts to reach more children and families in need of food assistance. For the coming school year of 2019-2020, the school board would like to see this program expanded to reach more students and families.

The Marie Wilkinson Food Pantry is an extension of the Aurora Feed The Hungry Program created by community leader Marie Wilkinson in the 1950s. Mrs. Wilkinson was a life-long activist for social and civil rights who fought against poverty, hunger, homelessness, joblessness, and injustice. She founded the Aurora Feed The Hungry project in the 1950s, giving out bags of food to those in need from her bungalow on View Street on Aurora's West Side. She was known to invite complete strangers into her

home, and soon she had started a soup kitchen – and later created the Marie Wilkinson Food Pantry, which serves thousands of Kane County's less-fortunate families each year.

2018 Achievements

- Every dollar donated to the Marie Wilkinson Food Pantry provides ~75 pounds of food to each neighbor in need each week. USDA calculates 1.2 pounds is an average meal (determined by age and appetite of individuals).
- The Pantry **fed more than 10,500 individuals**, of whom 3,700 were children under the age of 18, 668 over the age of 62 and 878 disabled.
- Pantry volunteers shared over 435 tons of food with guests, including 138 tons of fresh produce.
- 81% of food shared came from the Food Rescue Program, which has grown nearly 40 trips to local grocers each week by Marie's Food Rescue Volunteers.
- Marie's East Side Pantry was relocated into state of the art space in East Aurora High School (EAHS).
- Launched the new 'Food 4 Students' program in Aurora's schools. No Child Should Go Hungry!
- More than 900 EAHS students shopped for food to address hunger for their 4,047 family members, of whom 1,252 were younger siblings.
- Dairy and eggs, protein such as chicken, beef and fish, fresh fruits and vegetables, are distributed. Over **2000 lbs of vegetables** were harvested from Marie's Community Garden and other community gardens!
- The food distribution model is 'client choice.' This means guests may freely choose from a variety of nutritionally balanced items, just like they would in a grocery store.
- Partnerships with other agencies provide guests with healthcare assistance (flu shots, blood pressure monitoring), employment, and other vital community resources.
